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DADS—JUST DO IT!

The August 2015 *Lutheran Witness* contains some arresting statistics regarding the role of fathers in the spiritual life of their children (statistics, I might add, borne out in study after study):

- When dad and mom regularly (weekly) attend church, 75% of children persist in the church
- When dad regularly (weekly) attends church and mom doesn't, this falls by roughly half
- When dad does *not* regularly attend but mom does (weekly), the floor crumbles: only 2 to 3% of children stay in the church (*Lutheran Witness*, August 2015, p. 7) (Good Christians, pray for these moms and children!)

Now, to be sure, this isn't to say that moms aren't important. Nor should these stats cause them to lose heart or not to put to use the Lord's direction for fathers. After all, we hear nary a word about St. Timothy's father in Scripture; but we do hear about his mother Eunice and grandmother Lois who instructed Timothy in the faith (1 Tim 1:5); and the Lord through Moses commands "all Israel" to "teach [these words] to your children"—mothers to daughters and sons, fathers to sons and daughters (Deut 11:19). Above all, we have the Lord's promise that His Word does not return to Him void (Is 55:11)

But the stats above and the Lord's instruction in Scripture do warrant some focus on fathers.

Scripture tells us, "Faith comes by hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ" (Rom 10:17). In the Lord's original plan that word of Christ was to be taught by Adam ("the dad") to his family (see Gen 2:16; 3:1-3). That's the original pattern. And that's just what Adam did...until he didn't (see Gen 3:17).

And yet, despite Adam's failure that pattern—father to household—persisted.

- Noah taught the Word of God to *his* family (Gen: 6-7)
- At Passover the *father* is to tell his son the Lord's saving work in freeing the Israelites from the Egyptians (Ex 13:14)
- In Ex 20:5, the sins of the *fathers* are visited upon the children—chief of them not instructing their children in the Word of the Lord
- Father Joshua determines his family's devotion—"As for me and my household, we shall serve the Lord" (Jos 24:15)
- Fathers are to "bring [their children] up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord" (Eph. 6:4)
- In Acts Peter addresses the Jewish *men* gathered on Pentecost, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you and for your children" (Acts 2:38-39)
- Cornelius in Acts 10 and the jailer in Philippi (16:33) receive the Faith—and their households

How are fathers to do this? Here's an incomplete, high-level list:

- Be a student—hold the Word of God sacred and gladly hear and learn it, and then...
- Be a model
 - Regularly (weekly) attend church with the entire family

- Regularly (weekly) attend Bible study when the kids are in Sunday School
- Be a teacher
 - Have regular (daily) devotions with the family at home (use *Portals of Prayer*)
 - Talk about the sermon and the Sunday School lesson on the way home
 - Help the kids with catechesis at home and attend catechesis classes with them
- Be consistent—keep up the pattern throughout life

Dads, you have a big job. But in the words of the Nike ad, Just Do It. And trust that the Lord will bless your work on His behalf.

INTERESTED IN BECOMING A VOTING MEMBER?

The new constitution of our congregation defines “voting member” as a communicant member who has reached the age of 18 years and been received as a voting member upon application for such privilege upon approval of the voters of the assembly. This means that, unlike in the past, communicant women age 18 and above are eligible to join the voters assembly. **We encourage all eligible St. John’s members to join the voters assembly.**

To do so there are a few steps (details outlined in the policy below):

- Contact Pr. Bruss or an elder well prior to a voters meeting
- Review the constitution that you’ll be given by the elder or Pr. Bruss, and
- Attend the next voters meeting to be received as a voter

For those who’d like to join the voters assembly at the soonest possible date, contact an elder or Pr. Bruss well in advance of the 27 September voters meeting and please plan to attend that meeting once you’ve spoken with the pastor or an elder.

We’d like to make sure that our voters assembly include those who wish to be voters and accept the responsibilities thereof. With our current called staff vacancy there will be critical actions to be considered by the voters assembly in the near future.

Reception and Duties of Voters under Paragraph 5.2.3

1. An applicant for voting membership shall give notice of intention to the pastor or one of the elders and will be furnished a copy of the Constitution and By-laws of the congregation to read prior to a voters meeting in order to become a voter. At a subsequent constitutional meeting of the voters and in the presence of the applicant, a member of the Board of Elders shall present such application, the applicant shall sign the constitution, and the applicant will be received as a voter upon approval by the voters assembly.
2. It shall be the duty of every voting member to attend the voters assemblies. If a voter fails to attend such meeting, the voter waives the right to cast a vote during that meeting. Voters shall accept nominations for board membership and committee appointments, if possible, after having

been a voting member for a period of one year and shall participate in the business activities of the voters assembly.

3. Voting members who are absent from the meetings of the voters assembly for a full year without an excused absence shall have their name removed from the roster of voting members by the Board of Elders and informed by letter. However, they may be reinstated by re-applying for voting membership.

LIVING SACRIFICES BRAINSTORMING SESSION UPDATE

While the above session took place back in April, we wanted to let the congregation know that the information gathered isn't sitting dormant. Members of the Board of Stewardship, the Board of Missions, and Pastor Bruss have met to outline a game plan for how we proceed to process and implement the many ideas brought forth at that meeting. All ideas have been entered into spreadsheets. For the different topics area that we brainstormed on, there were 421 ideas posted. We also had 62 ideas for volunteer opportunities submitted with the cards we had on each table. Finally, we had 41 ideas on how we can best interest people in these opportunities. Obviously, there is some duplication of ideas, but you can see that we have no shortage of excellent ideas to work with. So the plan will start off with sending ideas pertaining to a particular board's area of responsibility to that board. First to weed out

duplications, and then using a ranking system we have put together to rate each idea. Below you will see the rating system:

Prioritize lists using the following scale:

- a. 1 - Great idea. Work on implementation now.
- b. 2 - Good idea. Will try to implement when we have the time or resources.
- c. 3 - Not Feasible at this time, will save for future consideration
- d. D - Done–We are already doing this.
- e. ?–We don't understand the suggestion, need more information.

Once we have the prioritization back from each board, we will build a master prioritized work list. While this is being done, it is our intention to form a Living Sacrifices Initiative Group to identify ways that we can recruit people to help work on the prioritized projects. Creatively identify ways to engage with people who currently do not volunteer. These ideas will come from the 41 suggestions submitted by the congregation during our brainstorming session. Finally, we plan to form a focus group from members of the congregation to meet with the Living Sacrifices Initiative Group and provide feedback on the ideas generated to engage with members. Working foremost with our top priority ideas, and the best ideas to encourage our members' interest, this group will hopefully get the teams formed up to start tackling some of the great ideas submitted by our congregation. This is by no means an easy assignment, but one certainly well worth pursuing. Our overall theme for this process is: **Make Christian Friends, Do the Lord's Work, and Have Fun.** We feel confident with the Lord's guidance, that will happen.

ADDRESSING OUR DEBT BY HAVING A FORMAL CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

The Board of Stewardship has been looking into the feasibility of initiating one final campaign effort to retire the Building Campaign loan. The loan balance as of July 31 was \$953, 136.47. Looking at how the last couple of campaigns have gone, it is conceivable that it could possibly take three more 3-year campaigns to retire this debt. That is nine more years. Plus, in February of 2023, we will have to refinance our loan if it is not paid off. We have no idea what interest rates may be at that time. St. John's most certainly would benefit by paying off our debt. If there would be no further campaigns on this loan after this year, the monthly loan payment of \$6839.84 or the \$82,078.08 per year would have to be rolled into the church's operating budget. As finances now stand, that is an expense we don't believe the operating budget can absorb. So the Board of Stewardship believes some sort of capital campaign needs to be launched to retire the debt. The question becomes whether we should do that ourselves or hire a professional firm to lead us through a formal campaign. We believe there are many good reasons to hire professionals.

First of all, we have found a firm that is rooted in the confessional and liturgical theology that we cherish – Wittenberg Church Consultants, Naperville, Illinois. They serve only Lutheran churches and have done several campaigns in churches like ours. Second, professionally run campaigns are more successful than home-spun ones. Most importantly, a professionally run campaign will increase our general stewardship, involve more members, unite us around a common goal, and lead us more deeply into God's word and sacraments.

What does a campaign look like and what would it entail? There would be twenty weeks of training and enacting the campaign followed by a three year period in which we would make our gifts. The pledges raised typically equal 100% to 150% of annual offerings. For St. John's this would amount to \$600,000 to \$900,000. The latter figure would basically retire our debt. This capital fundraising firm would spend a couple of days with us to learn our systems and our way of doing church and then customize the program for us. They would then return for periodic training sessions and lead ten different teams through each step of the campaign. The campaign would include a spiritual renewal component for each member of St. Johns, along with several additional short publications on spiritual renewal, prayer and

stewardship. There would also be a campaign video, home gatherings, special sermons and Bible studies, all of which would culminate in a congregation-wide fellowship event where our pledges would be gathered.

Bringing in an outside firm would raise the level of intensity of our campaign, save our pastors and leaders preparation time, keep us on track, and more effectively help us pay down our debt in a timely manner. We present this information at this time, as the Church Council has voted to bring this issue before a Voters Assembly on September 27. More information will be forthcoming via bulletin inserts and email submissions and we ask for your prayerful consideration of this important matter.

The Neighborhood Care Team wishes to express their sincere appreciation for those who volunteered to help with the event, and also to those church members and families who attended the event and helped interact with the neighbors in attendance. This event continues to be one of the top attended sites for the Night Out Against Crime in the City. This year, there were approximately 80 sites around the City of Topeka for this event.
